### COMMUNITY IMPACT: PAST PROJECTS

The Junior League of Salt Lake City is a volunteer organization for women interested in making an impact in their community. As a member of the Association of Junior Leagues International (AJLI), which is made up of 293 Junior Leagues in four countries, Junior League of Salt Lake City began as the Salt Lake Junior Aid in 1931 and was accepted into membership of the Association of Junior Leagues in 1934, after a probationary period of training and education. Since that time, an ever-changing program of volunteer activity, financial support, and service has been tailored to the growing Salt Lake community.

From the beginning the Junior League, in collaboration with community agencies, has had numerous successful projects, many of which continue to make a significant impact to our community and are readily recognizable by both the public and various community resource agencies. During the past 77 years of community service, the League's involvement has been in the areas of the arts, social welfare, child welfare, criminal justice system, and education. Since 1990, the League has turned its attention to critical issues facing the environment, women and substance abuse, mentally ill adults, and healthcare issues, as we continue to seek solutions for problems endemic in our community. ## COMMUNITY IMPACT: CURRENT PROJECTS

To achieve both our mission and ensure our ongoing community impact, our volunteers and community partners provide money for and staff long-term League-owned and "done-in-a-day" projects. More than 185 active volunteers contribute over 25,000 volunteer hours per year in order to support our current projects, which include the following.

### Junior League CARE Fair (Community Assistance and Resource Event)

Junior League CARE Fair, which celebrated its 17<sup>th</sup> year in 2009, is an annual 2-day event organized and directed by the Junior League of Salt Lake City for families needing routine medical services and community assistance information. Typically, there are major barriers (i.e., time, language, financial, and transportation constraints) that prevent some Utah families from receiving many basic health and human services. The Junior League CARE Fair eliminates many of these barriers by bringing together community agencies and medical service providers at one time and in one place. The majority of medical services are provided free of charge. This event, held in August 2009, served more than 4549 people. In 2008 we serviced 2145. The following medical services were provided

- 497 immunization shots given to 315 children
- 358 pap and breast exams (50 referred for further treatment)
- 805 physical exams performed
- 680 hearing checks
- 350 dental screenings (125 dental sealants were applied)
- 90 Pediatric Ortho examinations
- 600 diabetes screenings
- 600 cholesterol screenings
- 17 pregnancy tests
- 145 STD and HIV tests
- 105 adult podiatry exams
- 168 children received childcare on-site while parents participated in exams and screenings
- 24 depression screenings
- Over 132 bike helmets given away
- Over 153 car seats given away
- 2300 books were given away
- Over 240 community volunteers and agencies distributed information on local health and social services for year-round care
- More than 257 medical volunteers from local medical organizations
- 55 translators
- 1,860 volunteer hours

## Women Helping Women

Women Helping Women, a boutique-style clothing closet, is a project in which Junior League of Salt Lake City volunteers collect, prepare and distribute donated, professional women's clothing to women entering the workforce and who are in transition towards self-sufficiency. Clients are referred to the project by government and social service agencies. Women Helping Women has served nearly 10,000 women since 1996.

In 2008-2009, Junior League of Salt Lake Women Helping Women volunteers:

- Served approximately 748 women
- Distributed more than 10,691 articles of clothing and personal items to our clients
- Served women referred from approximately 50 community, government and social service agencies
- Provided more than 2979 volunteer hours

The Boutique was chosen as a worksite for the United Way Utah's Day of Caring in September 2007, hosting volunteers from two financial institutions who assisted with various tasks. Women Helping Women also continued its partnership with Globus Relief Foundation who supplied discounted health and beauty products for the Boutique clients and participated in several clothing drives involving the Utah Paralegal Division of Utah State Bar and Women Lawyers of Utah.

## Mini Projects

The Mini Projects Committee provides volunteers and funding to short-term projects in collaboration with other nonprofit organizations. These projects, typically "done-in-a-day," tend to focus on smaller projects or portions of large projects that can be completed in a short time frame. Last year, the Junior League of Salt Lake City provided 480 volunteer hours and \$8,500 in financial assistance to seven community projects.

Projects in 2008-2009 included:

- Handing out car seats and bike helmets at CARE Fair for any child receiving immunizations and physicals.
- Sahara Cares 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Autism Carnival Saturday, September 13, 2008, at Wheeler Farm: This event featured sensory activities, inflatable toys, a scavenger hunt, and an Information Fair for children with autism and their families. The Junior League of Salt Lake City provided money, 45 volunteer hours and over 700 cupcakes for the 1500 participants.
- Guadalupe School Arts Kickoff: The school did not have an arts program, and because of a generous grant from the Fieldstone Foundation they now have one. The Junior League of Salt Lake City provided money and 60 volunteers toward a kickoff party. The night provided an opportunity for families of Guadalupe Schools to experience art together. Families and League volunteers participated with artists in three different art activities. League volunteers also staffed a nursery and helped serve dinner to the 150 participants.
- Kennedy Junior High School Reality Town: 400 students were given a job and monthly income based upon their GPA. They then had to navigate through town, which League members helped to staff. Students were surprised at how expensive things were and how quickly their income was spent, especially on things that aren't fun. The Junior League of Salt Lake City donated 75 volunteer hours and the money to pay for books for the students. Previously they had to use photocopies.
- Junior League Night at the Utah Food Bank: More than 40 adults and 10 children volunteered at the Utah Food Bank for a total of 100 volunteer hours. They helped sort food and the children decorated food boxes for delivery to senior citizens in the community. 6,466 pounds of food were sorted and 50 food boxes were

decorated. The Mini Projects committee donated \$2500 which was matched with a donation from Energy Solutions. Many of those who volunteered also brought food or monetary donations.

- Kids in the Kitchen: The Junior League of Salt Lake City held a Kids in the Kitchen event at Riley Elementary, a Title 1 school located behind the Sorenson Center. The event was geared toward helping 250 students make healthy eating and lifestyle choices. The Junior League provided over 90 volunteer hours.
- I Remember Mama: Every year around Mother's Day, Volunteers of America of Utah holds a special dinner for women in recovery called *I Remember Mama*. The women from the Center for Women and Children's detoxification center are included in this event. It is an opportunity to hear from other women in similar situations and phases of recovery. It is a time of personal renewal and an opportunity for women to make a fresh start. Junior League of Salt Lake City provided dresses for the women from the Women Helping Women Boutique; coordinated hairstyling and makeup on the day of the event provided by the Paul Mitchell School as well as a portrait prior to the dinner; a framed print of this portrait was provided after the event. JLSLC also provided new sheets and towels for the center that will serve these women throughout the year. The JLSLC spent 50 volunteer hours and served 380 women and 72 children.

### **RISE (Refugee Integration into Society through Education)**

RISE is the newest project of the Junior League of Salt Lake City, finishing its first year in 2007-2008. In collaboration with Catholic Community Services, RISE assists refugee women in their efforts to successfully transition to life in the United States. RISE provides skill classes which teach such basics as hygiene, cooking, budgeting, finance, etc. RISE successfully trained four groups of refugee women from Somalia and Burma.

Through RISE, Junior League of Salt Lake City members create and teach a six-week course with local refugee women. This course is repeated 4 times throughout a year, with 6-10 participants in each class.

The course does not turn the refugees into "Americans"; rather, it celebrates the diversity they bring to our community. In order to live successfully in this country, refugees need to learn certain everyday skills that they have not needed before. The RISE committee has created a course that will teach the women, and thus their families, the basic knowledge and necessary skills to understand our ways and be self-sustaining members of our society. The curriculum focus on three areas: health/wellness, hygiene/cleanliness and budget/finance.

Over the course of this year, Junior League of Salt Lake City members have volunteered over 1500 hours to this project. The committee uses money to buy all of the supplies needed to teach these principles such as: toothbrushes, toothpaste, dental floss, food, shampoo, laundry detergent, soap, deodorant, lotion, garbage bags, oven mitts, food storage containers, paper.

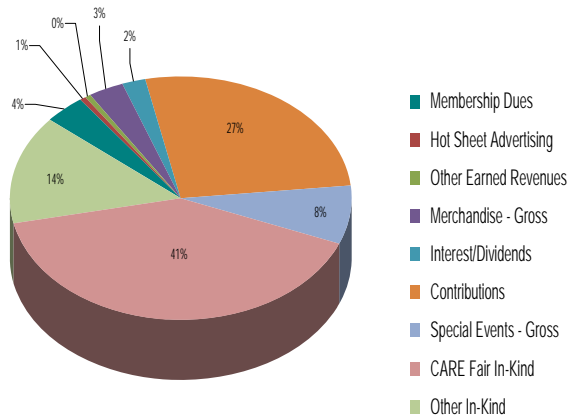

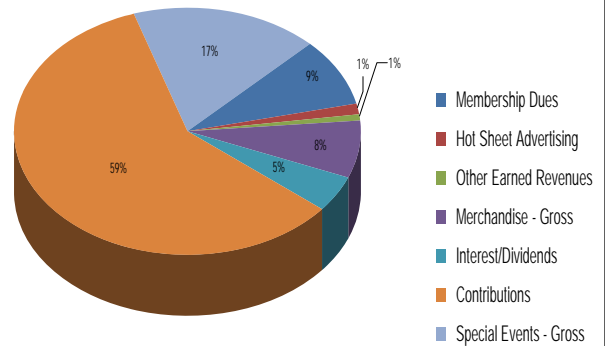
### INCOME

June 2008 - May 2009



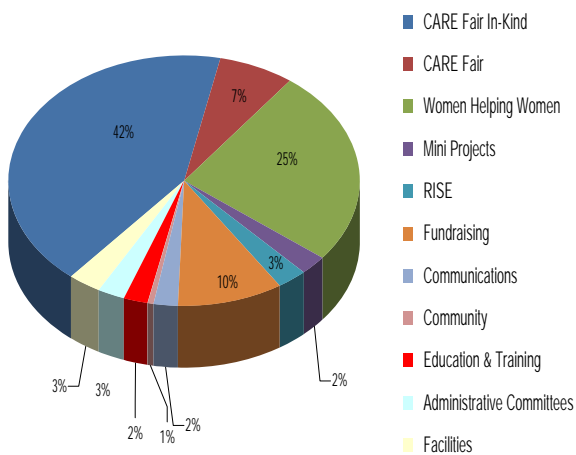
### INCOME

 June 2008 - May 2009



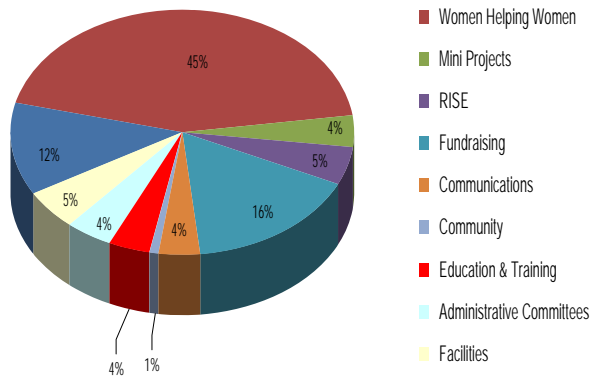
### EXPENSES

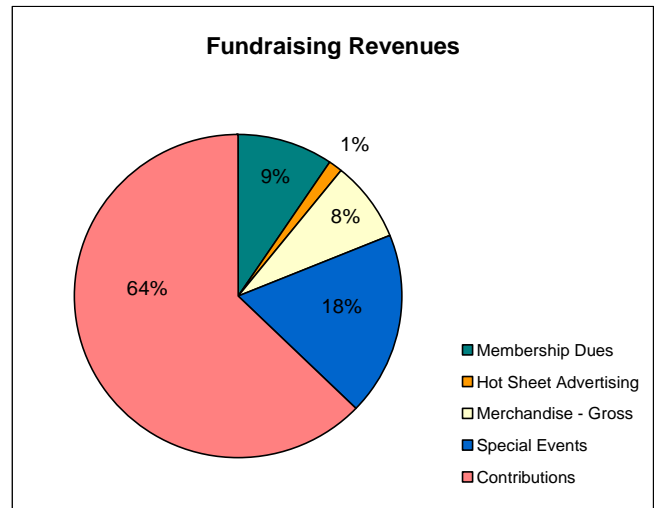

**FUNDRAISING**

The League's project work in the community depends on financial contributions from fundraising efforts. The Junior League of Salt Lake City raises funds through several channels, and this diversity ensures that no single area bears the majority of the fundraising burden. Fundraising efforts focus on contributions from corporations, foundations and individuals, as well as special events, merchandise sales and our annual gift campaign.



**Special Events: Black and White Night 2008**

The 9<sup>th</sup> annual Black and White Hollywood Night was held October 4, 2008, at The Depot in Salt Lake City. It was a red carpet evening of food, drinks, live music, Elvis, Marilyn Monroe and great auction items. Hollywood night was well attended. The VIP dinner was held prior to the event at Flemings where 100% was donated. Guests experienced a great social evening while celebrating the Junior League of Salt Lake City's impact on women and children in our community. This annual fundraising event ensures we raise the majority of our funds for our community projects, with all proceeds benefiting the Junior League of Salt Lake City.

In December, a silent auction was held in conjunction with our annual Holiday Luncheon. The most popular item was a free LASIK surgery donated by Hoopes Vision.

Special events also had "Keys on Main" on February 20, 2009. They auctioned dates with unique and aspiring bachelor/bachelorettes in the community. All guests enjoyed the evening listening to the piano music and participating in the auction.

They concluded the year with a portrait day at LaCaille with Sprout photography.

**Merchandise Sales**

We conduct year-round fundraising through the sale of our signature cookbooks, commemorative scarves, and note cards – collectively termed Merchandise Sales.

Junior Leagues nationwide are known for their cookbooks. The Junior League of Salt Lake City currently publishes 2 cookbooks: *Always in Season* and *Heritage Cookbook*. All proceeds from cookbook sales go to the Junior League of Salt Lake City.

*Always in Season*-With photography by Tom Till showcasing Utah's stunning landscapes, this cookbook captures the bounty and beauty of Utah. It is brimming with over 200 mouth-watering recipes using the season's freshest ingredients, and was awarded the distinction of being the Official Cookbook of the Utah Travel Council.

*Heritage Cookbook* -The mainstay cookbook of the Junior League of Salt Lake City for over 25 years, the *Heritage Cookbook* was designated Utah's Bicentennial Cookbook. A collection of classic and traditional recipes reflecting Utah's past and present, it represents glimpses of the cultural diversity found in our state.

Other Leagues' Cookbooks - We have an assortment of other Junior League cookbooks from across the country.

*JLSLC Online Store* -

The JLSLC online store sells notecards, cookbooks and our silk commemorative scarves. All proceeds go to the Junior League of Salt Lake City.

### **Annual Gift Campaign**

Junior League volunteers and community members show their support through countless volunteer hours but also generously support the Junior League with financial contributions in an annual gift campaign.

### **Grant Writing**

The Junior League along with FRCI (Fund Raising Council, Inc.) actively solicits grants and other monies to support our projects.
